Message from the Chairperson

Board of Trustees – Future Generations Trust

As we reflect on the achievements of 2025, I am filled with pride and gratitude for the resilience, commitment, and impact demonstrated by Future Generations Trust throughout the year. Despite a backdrop of regional uncertainty and economic challenges, our dedication to conservation and community empowerment remained steadfast. Through careful stewardship of our resources, we continued to deliver meaningful and lasting change across the communities and conservation landscapes we support.

During the year, we advanced important research into large carnivore conservation in the Ishasha sector of Queen Elizabeth National Park, expanded educational opportunities through scholarships for vulnerable students, and strengthened access to healthcare and clean water for communities living alongside some of Uganda's most important protected areas. These achievements reflect our belief that conservation success is intrinsically linked to the wellbeing and prosperity of local people.

Our impact has been made possible through the strength of our partnerships. We are deeply grateful for the collaboration and support of local leaders, community organisations, conservation agencies, and valued partners including the Uganda Wildlife Authority, Uganda Conservation Foundation, and Bwindi Community Hospital. Together, we have demonstrated that effective conservation extends beyond protecting wildlife and habitats—it is equally about creating opportunities, improving livelihoods, and fostering hope for future generations.

Looking ahead to 2026, we remain ambitious in our vision and practical in our approach. We will launch new Community Livelihood and Women's Savings Group initiatives in the Murchison Falls landscape, expand our scholarship programme to support students from vulnerable communities in Buhoma, Ishasha, and Entebbe, and invest in improved sanitation and learning facilities at Bwindi Community Vocational College. We also look forward to pioneering a Batwa Women's Village Savings and Empowerment Scheme, designed to strengthen sustainable livelihoods and economic resilience within indigenous communities.

In addition, we will continue our annual medical outreach programmes, bringing essential healthcare services to thousands of people living in and around Murchison Falls National Park, while increasing

opportunities for youth engagement in conservation. By inspiring and empowering the next generation, we are helping to cultivate future custodians of Uganda's natural heritage.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I extend my sincere thanks to all our donors, partners, volunteers, and supporters. Your generosity and commitment are the foundation of our work and the catalyst for the positive change we achieve together. Through our collective efforts, we continue to demonstrate that conservation and community development are inseparable, and that investing in people is one of the most effective ways to safeguard the future of our environment.

With optimism, determination, and a shared sense of purpose, we enter 2026 ready to deepen our partnerships, broaden our impact, and continue building a legacy of conservation, opportunity, and resilience for generations to come.

Trustees Report

Our vision and objective

Our vision is for Uganda to have environmentally-conscious and prospering communities coexisting alongside thriving populations of wildlife.

Our objective is to raise funds and assist in accomplishing our vision to the best of our ability, in the most effective and sustainable manner.

Our purpose and activities

Future Generations Trust is dedicated to creating a brighter tomorrow where communities and wildlife thrive together. In Uganda's treasured landscapes, from the misty Bwindi impenetrable Forest to the sweeping savannas of Queen Elizabeth National Park and Murchison Falls, and the vibrant hub of Entebbe, we work hand in hand with local people in the communities to protect nature while nurturing sustainable livelihoods. By uniting conservation with community empowerment, we are building a legacy of hope, resilience, and harmony for generations to come.

We believe that lasting impact is achieved through collaboration. Rather than working in isolation, we strategically partner with like-minded specialized organizations whose programs align with our mission and vision. This approach allows us to amplify our reach and ensure that both communities and wildlife benefit from well-established, well-planned and well-executed initiatives. By joining forces, we maximize efficiency, strengthen conservation outcomes, and empower local communities by building a future where shared efforts create shared success.

Structure, governance and management

Board of Trustees

The Future Generations Trust is governed by a Board of Trustees composed of six committed members. Each trustee brings unique expertise and professional experience, ensuring diverse perspectives in strategic planning and decision-making. This collective knowledge strengthens the Trust's ability to evaluate, fund, and oversee projects that align with its core mission.

Governance and Meetings

Quarterly Meetings: The FGT Board convenes in person at least four times annually. These sessions are dedicated to proposing, presenting, discussing, and evaluating projects supported by FGT.

Interim Communications: Between formal meetings, trustees maintain active engagement through email and WhatsApp, enabling timely coordination and decision-making.

Collaborative Oversight: Trustees share responsibilities according to their availability, ensuring that all projects receive appropriate attention and monitoring and Evaluation.

Trustee Engagement

Project Familiarization: Trustees regularly update themselves on the progress of funded initiatives, visiting projects in person when feasible, at least annually.

Shared Responsibility: Each trustee covers a portion of the Trust's operational tasks, contributing to balanced governance and effective oversight.

Continuous Learning: By engaging directly with project teams, trustees gain firsthand insights into challenges and successes, strengthening accountability and project(s) impact assessment.

Strategic Value

The Board's structure fosters:

1. **Diversity of thought** in planning and evaluation.
2. **Flexibility** in trustee contributions, accommodating varying schedules.
3. **Transparency and accountability** through direct project oversight.
4. **Governance Sustainability** by balancing formal meetings with ongoing digital communication.

Staff & Management

Administration and Accounting

Matters relating to administration and accounting are dealt with via the assistance of our trust Administrator/Accountant – Miriam Nalwaniko – who also sits with the Board of Trustees for meetings as an ex-officio member and arranges formal minutes.

Project Manager

Christopher Yikii-the project manager, continued to assist with day-to-day administration and follow-through of all the projects of the FGT and building relationships with the communities and partners in the areas where the Trust is involved in supporting projects. And the impact from the FGT projects in the communities has been greatly felt by the beneficiaries in the conservation areas.

Auditors

Ellie and Associates served as the external auditors for the Trust, conducting an audit of the FGT annual accounts for the year 2025. Their review and audits ensured compliance with applicable financial standards and procedures, in line with legally recognized accounting practices for non-profit organizations in Uganda.

Partnerships with FGT-In July 2024, FGT formalized two Memorandum of Understanding to support our revenue-sharing arrangements. The first, with G&C Tours, covers guest fees from overnight stays at Buhoma Lodge and Ishasha Wilderness Camp, as well as safari traveller guests.

The second, with Bakers Lodge (Anyadwe House), relates to guest fees from overnight stays at Anyadwe House in Murchison Falls National Park. These agreements reinforce collaboration with FGT and provide a clear framework for managing revenues from accommodation and safari activities.

The partnerships highlighted in this report represent ongoing collaborations that extend from prior years. This annual report focuses exclusively on the developments and activities within the current reporting period. Future Generations Trust has continued its strategic partnership with Bwindi Community Hospital, a collaboration that connects conservation tourism with community health and education. Many guests visiting the region for gorilla trekking also tour the hospital, gaining insight into its vital role in local wellbeing and supporting conservation in the Bwindi area.

In 2025, FGT's support focused on strengthening maternal and child health by covering the annual salaries of two professional neonatal nurses in the hospital's Neonatal intensive care Unit.

Additionally, FGT funded the salary of an HIV/TB counsellor for both 2024 and 2025, ensuring continuity of psychosocial support services to the community in the area of HIV/ Aids.

This investment in the Neonatal Unit had a significant impact in 2025, contributing to improved newborn survival rates, enhanced maternal care, and greater community resilience. A clear demonstration of how tourism-driven initiatives can extend benefits beyond conservation, fostering trust and wellbeing across the wider community. In FY 2024/2025, the ward recorded 282 neonatal admissions (26% of total admissions). Among these neonates:115 (40.8%) were admitted for jaundice (the single biggest cause of NICU admissions). 99 (35.1%) were preterm babies, and 57 (20.2%) had neonatal sepsis. Overall neonatal survival improved from 91% in 2023/24 to 92.3% this year. A clear reflection of what strategic collaboration can do to impact communities in the conservation areas.

The second strategic focus area was HIV/TB counselling In 2025, FGT's partnership with Bwindi Community Hospital delivered significant community health impact by funding an HIV/TB counsellor, enabling 5,131 clients to be tested for HIV with 49 (1%) positive cases all linked to homecare and treatment, 55 individuals enrolled on PEP, and 80% of people living with HIV/AIDS screened for cervical cancer with a strengthened follow- up through peer educators, ensuring vital services reached vulnerable populations and this reinforced the hospital's capacity to provide comprehensive care to the community.

BATWA EMPOWERMENT VILLAGE(BEV) - <https://batwauganda.org/>

In 2025, Future Generations Trust (FGT) deepened its commitment to the Batwa Empowerment Village, advancing cultural preservation and sustainable livelihoods. Through partnerships with Buhoma Lodge, international visitors were encouraged to experience Batwa traditions and the community walking trail, generating direct income for indigenous Batwa families. FGT provided targeted funding for a full secondary school scholarship for a Batwa child, Babrah Natukunda, ensuring access to quality education and future opportunities. Additionally, FGT supported Batwa women through exchange visits and training in the Village Savings and Loan Scheme (VSLA). This initiative enabled 30 women, 15men, and staff to establish a tailored savings and loan scheme, fostering financial inclusion, strengthening household resilience, and enhancing community livelihoods among the Batwa.

Together, these efforts highlight FGT's holistic approach: empowering education, culture, and economic self-reliance within the Batwa community.

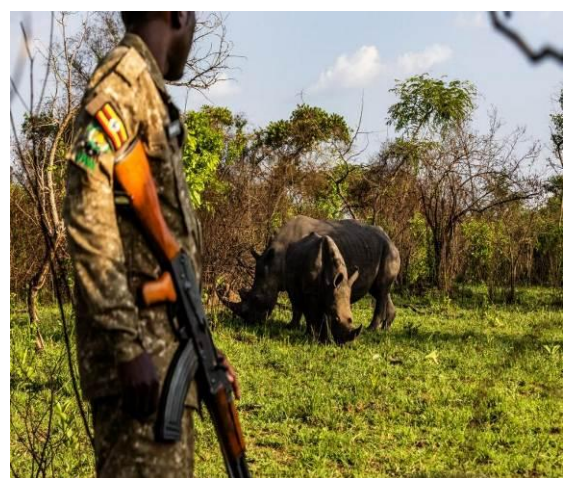

Ride 4 a Woman is a Ugandan non-governmental organisation, dedicated to supporting and empowering women struggling with poverty, HIV, abuse and domestic violence, single motherhood, widowhood in Buhoma area of Bwindi. Many of these women never attended any school for formal education. Future Generations Trust has continued to provide ongoing support to these women by buying, using, and selling their locally tailored and woven products and regularly taking guests to visit and support their income generating projects to improve their family livelihood.

FGT has continued to support UCF as a full annual member to their organisation thereby assisting towards their efforts for conservation around Uganda.

LARGE CARNIVORE MONITORING PROJECT QENP

FGT continued to partner with Masters Student researchers from Makerere University, based at Ishasha Wilderness Camp, QENP towards monitoring the large carnivores with the focus moving to the **spotted hyena** of the area which are renowned in their behaviour patterns in line with weather and other ecological changes.

FGT has supported two other organisations working in QENP with Large Carnivore research with \$5000 being donated to the Volcanoes Partnership Kyambura Lion Monitoring Project and the Uganda Carnivore Project (UCP) for continued field work and monitoring of the large carnivores.

Alongside ecological research, the team monitored **community conflict**, documenting livestock raiding incidents and beginning to explore strategies to reduce tensions between local communities and wildlife. This dual focus—scientific discovery and human–wildlife coexistence—ensured that the project’s impact extended beyond the park boundaries of QENP.

By laying the groundwork for healthier hyena populations and fostering collaboration with local communities, the project has created a lasting conservation impact. It represents a vital step toward ensuring that Ishasha’s carnivores thrive in balance with the people who share their landscape, while also strengthening Uganda’s next generation of conservation scientists.

ISHASHA COMMUNITY UPLIFT GROUP (ICUG)

In the year under review, Future Generations Trust supported subsistence farmers in Kazinga, adjacent to southern Queen Elizabeth National Park, by equipping them with business development skills. This enabled several members to channel savings into small business start-ups. Working with the Ishasha community, an assessment of the Ishasha Community Uplift Group identified coffee and cocoa as priority crops due to strong market demand, favourable prices, and established value chains, while piloting poultry rearing for households with limited land. This integrated strategy strengthens commercialization, diversifies income, and provides sustainable alternatives for reformed poachers, thereby enhancing community resilience and aligning livelihoods with conservation goals.

BWINDI COMMUNITY VOCATIONAL COLLEGE(BCVC) - <https://bwindivocationalcollege.com/>

In 2025, FGT strengthened the Tourism Department at Bwindi Community Vocational College by funding the expansion of its lecturer team from two to four tutors. This investment covered monthly costs throughout the year, ensuring consistent, high-quality instruction. As a result, tourism students were better prepared for examinations and future careers, benefiting from professional and committed teaching. Beyond classroom support, FGT facilitated student placements in the Buhoma area lodges and hotels, creating direct pathways to employment.

The local lodges employing the students have expressed strong appreciation for the graduates' professionalism and service quality, a clear reflection of the rigorous training they received. This initiative has not only enhanced student outcomes but also contributed to the growth of the local tourism sector, reinforcing the college's reputation as a hub for vocational excellence.

ANNUAL MEDICAL OUTREACH CAMP – MFNP

In partnership with Apar Foundation, Future Generations Trust renewed its commitment to communities in Ngwedo Subcounty and the surrounding villages of Murchison Falls National Park in Buliisa District with its 6th Annual Medical Camp in March 2025

With the program growing year on year quality first line healthcare was provided free of charge to 3,651 patients in just four days with the support of 39 medical doctors and other medical camp volunteers. Common conditions such as malaria, upper respiratory tract infections, and gastritis were managed effectively, while serious cases were referred to hospitals for specialist care.

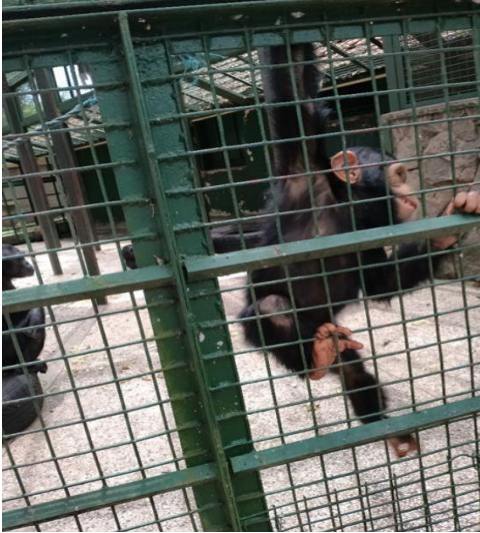

Beyond medical treatment, the outreach integrated broader community development initiatives. Expert sessions on hygiene and nutrition were conducted at Paraa Primary School and staff of Wild Frontiers Boats and nearby lodges, a new borehole was initiated at Mivule-Nunda to provide clean water, and donations of mattresses and scholastic materials were distributed to vulnerable learners and families during the period and in partnership with Apar Foundation.

These efforts demonstrate a holistic approach to community well-being: combining healthcare, education, and infrastructure to strengthen resilience and improve the quality of life of the communities in and around the MFNP conservation area. Looking ahead, Future Generations Trust aims to expand annual healthcare access, deepen community health education, and scale up Village Savings and Loan Schemes (VSLA) and “kitchen” vegetable growing projects to ensure lasting and sustainable impact.



Future Generations Trust continued its partnership with the Uganda Wildlife Education Centre (UWEC) to support the long-term care of confiscated chimpanzees that cannot be reintroduced into the wild. These animals require lifelong medical attention, food, and housing; a commitment that can span over five decades.

In 2025, FGT contributed \$2,500 towards UWEC's annual veterinary and medical program. This support enabled the centre to conduct routine diagnostic and physical examinations, implement preventive care such as deworming and vaccinations, and carry out essential treatments for wounds, respiratory infections, and skin conditions. The funding also supported humane population management efforts, helping to reduce welfare risks associated with overcrowding and allowing for planned breeding.

Despite these successes, UWEC's veterinary team faced challenges in sourcing effective subdermal contraceptive implants locally, which impacted the population control program. Nevertheless, the ongoing routine health checks remain vital to maintaining high welfare standards and ensuring the successful rehabilitation of the chimpanzees under UWEC's care.

Other Partnerships

Scholarship Students & School Support by Future Generations Trust

FGT -June 2025 School outreach to Rubona Primary school Buhoma, hard to reach areas and donated scholastic materials, sanitary materials to the girls and jackets to the lower primary students to keep them warm during the cold weather.

FGT sponsored a golf tournament at Entebbe golf club as part of a Charity support towards vocational and skills training for visually impaired women to offer massage therapy services, improving livelihoods and health access.

2025 FGT Overall Performance and Key Achievements

Future Generations Trust has worked on structuring its ability to make the most impact in the communities around the conservation areas with the available funds. Income generation has not increased significantly as it relies mainly on the guest fee contributions which have remained fairly stable in spite of Tourism related challenges due to diseases (EBOLA) and conflict (ADF in DR Congo). Organizationally, FGT expanded its administrative capacity with two dedicated staff members — Miriam overseeing finance and administration, and Chris managing projects. The Board of Trustees maintained consistent quarterly meetings, both in-person and online, ensuring strong governance and strategic oversight.

In 2025, Future Generations Trust continued to strengthen its role as a catalyst for conservation and community empowerment, despite ongoing challenges in tourism revenue caused by Ebola outbreaks and regional conflict. With steady guest fee contributions, the Trust maximized its impact by focusing on research, education, health, and partnerships.

In the area of research and education, FGT supported a master's student studying large carnivores in the Ishasha circuit area, generating valuable insights into wildlife behaviour and human-wildlife interactions. Scholarships were also awarded to a Tourism & Hospitality student at Bwindi Community Vocational College and to an indigenous Batwa secondary school student, while the Ishasha Women's Saving Group received training in business skills and financial management, linking livelihoods with conservation awareness.

FGT also made significant strides in health and social welfare. Neonatal care and HIV/AIDS counselling services were strengthened at Bwindi Community Hospital. Through a partnership with the APAR Foundation, water access was improved in Kazinga community, Ishasha and a borehole water at Mivule Nunda in Bulisa district. The annual medical outreach at Ngwedo, Murchison Falls National Park touched the lives of over 3600 community members and continues to be an extremely well received facility for medical services in the area.

Collaboration remained central to FGT's mission. The Trust partnered with communities in conservation areas around Murchison Falls, Ishasha, and Queen Elizabeth National Park, while also working with strategic partners such as UWA on the Save a Rhino campaign, Uganda Conservation Fund, Bwindi Community Hospital, and Bwindi Community Vocational College and APAR foundation.

Through these initiatives, FGT demonstrated resilience and commitment to its vision: empowering communities, advancing conservation, and ensuring that even modest resources deliver transformative impact.

Outlook and Plans for 2026.

Looking ahead, Future Generations Trust is committed to deepening its impact across conservation areas and surrounding communities. Building on the achievements of 2025, the Trust will focus on livelihoods, education, health, empowerment, and youth engagement programs for improved livelihoods.

FGT plans to launch Community Livelihoods and Women's Village Savings and Loans Group projects at Murchison Falls National Park, supporting women's saving groups. We believe this initiative will strengthen financial independence and promote sustainable livelihoods linked to conservation in this area.

Education and infrastructure remain a cornerstone of FGT's mission. The Future Generations Trust Educational Scholarship (FGTE) program will expand to support four students from vulnerable communities in Entebbe, Ishasha, Bwindi, and Murchison Falls. To improve learning environments, FGT will construct an ablution block at Bwindi Community Vocational College, enhancing sanitation facilities, and will continue supporting four tutors in the Tourism and Hospitality Studies department at the college (BCVC).

FGT has plans to pioneer a Batwa Empowerment Village Savings and Loans Association (VSLA) initiative in the Buhoma area by providing technical support. This project aims to empower indigenous women through financial inclusion and skills development to be able to foster sustainable livelihoods.

This year, Future Generations Trust will advance its mission of improving livelihoods for households living around conservation areas by launching *Next Level Projects* for Ishasha Community Uplift Group that integrate sustainable agriculture with community empowerment. Through targeted support, families with access to land shall be equipped with inputs for coffee and cocoa farming and hands-on training in agronomic practices to enhance productivity.

For households with limited or no farmland, FGT plans to roll out poultry rearing projects alongside training in poultry management to strengthen food security and income generation in the area with conservation-friendly farming practices. Special emphasis shall be placed on youth and women inclusion, ensuring that vulnerable groups actively participate and benefit from the initiated projects.

We believe these efforts will strengthen household resilience, diversify income streams, and deepen community commitment to conservation and sustainable livelihoods.

Financial Review

The Future Generations Trust operates a financial year running from January to December and this annual report covers the period from January to December 2025.

The Future Generations Trust continues to derive the majority of its income for the 2025 financial year from guests staying at Buhoma Lodge, Ishasha Wilderness Camp and Anyadwe House. Each guest contributed USD10 per bed night towards community and wildlife conservation projects that are supported by FGT.

For this reason, the trust will continue to operate on a conservative basis, always allowing some annual funds collected to be kept aside as an investment, to continue to finance our core projects, even in difficult times.
